# Louis Armstrong's Trumpet

#### What You Need:

- Cardstock (preferably yellow or white)
- Construction paper (any colour)
- Glue
- Bowl

- Scissors
- Glitter (gold)
- Paintbrush
- Printer or Pencil

## Directions:

- 1. On cardstock, print out the trumpet template on the next page. If you don't have a printer you can also draw the trumpet and musical notes on a piece of cardstock.
- 2. Cut the trumpet and musical notes out.
- 3. Pour some glue and glitter to the bowl and mix.
- 4. Have your little one 'paint' the glue-glitter mixture onto the trumpet and musical notes.
- 5. Let dry.
- 6. Once dry, have your little one glue the trumpet and musical notes onto a piece of construction paper.

# Talking Points:

Tell your little one about how Louis Armstrong was an African American musician who became very famous for revolutionizing jazz music with his trumpet solos. Play some jazz music for your little one.



# Garrett Morgan Traffic Light

#### What You Need:

- Construction paper (black, grey, red, yellow, green)
- Black marker
- Scissors
- Glue

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#### Directions:

- 1. On the black piece of construction paper, cut out a large rectangle.
- 2. On the grey piece of construction paper cut, out a rectangle slightly smaller than the black rectangle.
- 3. Draw 3 circles on the grey rectangle.
- 4. Cut out approximate 1-inch squares on the red, yellow, and green construction paper.
- 5. Have your little one glue red squares onto the top circle, yellow squares on the middle circle, and green squares on the bottom circle.

# **Talking Points:**

Tell your little one that Garrett Morgan was an African American man who invented the modern-day traffic light by adding the yellow light to it. Let your little one know that people were mean to him just because of the colour of his skin so he had to work extra hard to get jobs and make people believe his ideas were good. Talk to your little one about racism and how it is unfair and unacceptable.

#### What You Need:

- Construction paper (yellow, black, white, red)
- Coloured markers/pencils/crayons

- Scissors
- Glue

#### Directions:

- 1. On a piece of yellow construction paper, draw an outline of a bus and then cut it out.
- 2. On black construction paper draw two circles for the wheels, and a long rectangle for the window ledge on the bus. Then cut them out.
- 3. On white construction paper draw 3 rectangles, which will be the windows. Then cut them out.
- 4. On red construction paper cut out a small rectangle for the break light and a small semi-circle for the headlight.
- 5. Have your little one glue on the wheels, windows, lights, and window ledge onto the bus.
- 6. Have your little one draw people on the bus.

### Talking Points:

Tell your little one about Rosa Park who refused to give up her seat on a bus because she was tired of being treated as less of a person because of the colour of her skin. Talk to your little one about racism and how it is unfair and unacceptable.

From around 2 years of age, toddlers learn about racial differences and racial bias and how to deal and react to these differences from the people they love. So, talk to your little one about racial differences and encourage your little one to be kind and compassionate when interacting with people of all backgrounds.
