Dad Painting



What You Need:

- Paper (preferably cardstock)
- Paint (2-3 colours)
- Bowls (2-3 depending on how many paints you use)
- Paintbrush (or fingers)
- Painter's Tape

Directions:

- 1. On a piece of paper use painter's tape to spell out the word 'DAD".
- 2. Pour a little bit of paint into each bowl.
- 3. Give the paint to your little one along with a paintbrush (or let them use their fingers).
- 4. Encourage them to paint the page.
- 5. Let dry.
- 6. Peel off the painter's tape to uncover the word "DAD". You can also peel of the tape when the picture is still a little wet. The longer the tape stays on the picture the harder it will be to peel it off.
- 7. Date and sign the back of the artwork.

Talking Points:

Talk to your little artist about what the way the paint looks. Ask them what else is the same colour and talk to them about what happens when the two colours mix together (i.e. red and yellow make orange). Point to the letters "D" and "A" and say the name aloud. Tell them words that start with those letters.

Daddy Bear Trail Mix



What You Need:

- Construction Paper
- Ziplock Bag or Glass Jar with Lid
- Scissors

- Markers
- Clear Tape (i.e. Scotch Tape)
- Measuring Cup
- Trail Mix (either bought or made with ingredients such as raisons, cheerios, smarties, peanuts, cranberries, chocolate chips, pretzel sticks, goldfish crackers, etc.)

Directions:

- 1. Cut out a piece of construction paper that will fit on the Ziplock Bag or Glass Jar.
- 2. Write or have your child write "Daddy Bear Trail Mix. Love your little bear cub (name)".
- 3. Tape the piece of construction paper to the Ziplock bag or glass jar (this will be the label).
- 4. Have your little one use a measuring cup to add scoops of trail mix (or the mix of ingredients you chose) to a Ziplock bag or glass jar.
- 5. Seal the bag or put the lid on the glass jar.

Talking Points:

Talk to your little one about all the different ingredients that will go in the trail mix. Have your little one try all the different ingredients and tell you which one is their favourite (however, be mindful of allergies or ingredients that might be choking hazards). Talk to your little one about how many scoops of each ingredient they will put in the bag or jar. Count with them as they add the scoops.

To the Moon and Back



What You Need:

- Scissors
- Glue
- Picture of moon (or a grey circle)
- Coloured Paper
- Picture of child(ren) (head shot)
- Star Stickers (or cut out from construction paper)

Directions:

- 1. Fold a piece of coloured paper in half (black or dark blue would be recommended).
- 2. On the front of the card have your child (or adult, depending on ability) write "Dad/Daddy" at the top of the card on a light-coloured piece of paper (or have an adult do it).
- 3. Then have your child (or adult, depending on ability) write on three circles cut out of construction paper, the numbers 3, 2, 1 and glue under the word "Dad/Daddy".
- 4. On the inside of the card have your child glue the rocket ship and moon onto the picture.
- 5. Have your child glue their picture on the rocket ship. If you have more than one child, then all the children can either make their own individual cards, or they can all glue their photo onto one large rocket.
- 6. Write on another coloured paper the message "We/I love you to the moon and back, love _____". If your child can write their own name have them do this part, if not you can do it for them.
- 7. Cut out the message (or have your child cut it out) and have your child glue this message on the card as well.
- 8. Have your child decorate the whole card with lots and lots of star stickers.

Talking Points:

Talk to your little learner about how rocket ships can carry people to space, and how these people are called astronauts and must wear a special outfit called a space suit. But most importantly, talk about why dad is special and why he needs to be celebrated.


